BOARD POLICY

SUBJECT: BOARD OF PARDONS AND PAROLES MISSION STATEMENT

PURPOSE: To establish a policy that provides the Mission Statement of the Texas Board of Pardons and Paroles.

AUTHORITY: Texas Constitution Article 4, Section 11
Texas Government Code Section 508.049
Texas Administrative Code Title 37, Part 5, Chapter 141, Subchapter A

POLICY: The mission statement reflects the responsibilities for the operation of the parole process assigned to the Texas Board of Pardons and Paroles (Board) in cooperation with the Texas Board of Criminal Justice and the Texas Department of Criminal Justice. This policy provides the mission and vision statements for the Board as well as the description of specific locations where the Board intends to conduct business. However, the locations at which the Board conducts business may vary with parole panel member assignment as determined by the Presiding Officer.

PROCEDURE:

I. MISSION STATEMENT:

The mission of the Texas Board of Pardons and Paroles is to fulfill and exert its authority vested by the Texas Constitution to render impartial and informed release decisions and clemency recommendations to the Governor. In exercising its discretionary decision-making, the Board prioritizes public safety, safeguards victims' rights, while facilitating the safe and successful reentry of incarcerated individuals to become productive law-abiding citizens.

II. VISION STATEMENT – GENERAL:

The parole decision-makers (Board Members and Parole Commissioners), guided by sound application of the discretionary authority vested by the Constitution of the State of Texas, shall: render just determination regarding parole release and revocations, thereby maximizing the restoration of human potential while restraining the growth of prison and jail populations; impose reasonable and prudent conditions of release consistent with the goal of structured reintegration of the releasee into the community; and resolutely administer the clemency process with recommendations to the Governor fully commensurate with public safety and due consideration.

III. VISION STATEMENT – RELEASE:

The parole decision-makers (Board Members and Parole Commissioners), guided by sound application of the discretionary authority vested by the Constitution of the State of Texas, shall: review and consider all information provided in rendering parole release determinations; utilize the standard parole guidelines as a tool to aid in the discretionary parole release decision process; consider the participation and completion of treatment, educational and vocational programs, and courses and activities identified in the individual treatment plan; and utilize rehabilitation and treatment program tier voting options, as well as other available voting options, in rendering just determinations.

IV. VISION STATEMENT – VIOLATIONS:

The parole decision-makers (Board Members and Parole Commissioners), guided by sound application of the discretionary authority vested by the Constitution of the State of Texas, shall: assess and respond appropriately to the releasee's violation; make consistent and timely intervention/sanction decisions; utilize graduated sanctions and actions that meet the severity of the violation; and employ any other available resource to assist the releasee in complying with their structured reintegration into the community.

V. VISION STATEMENT – CLEMENCY:

The Board Members, guided by sound application of the discretionary authority vested by the Constitution of the State of Texas, shall: administer the clemency process in a fair and impartial manner; make recommendations after careful review and consideration of all information provided; and transmit appropriate recommendations to the Governor for a final determination.

VI. LOCATIONS:

Board Members and Parole Commissioners are headquartered throughout the state near major prison units in order to have better access to offenders. Board offices are located as indicated below:
